

summer spent in northern California wouldn't be complete without a visit to John Pence Gallery's annual group show that features many of the gallery's most talented



Patricia Watwood's new painting, Gen. continues her classical leanings but v a subtle twist. The painting features nudes, one facing back, one front, a still life of flowers and fruit in fron

light and shadows fell on the sloping San Francisco Street and how the light reflected off the cars, leading the viewers' eye up the steep incline to the top of Russian Hill."

In Julictte Aristides' new figurative painting, *Meditations*, the work focuses on the life of the model—a poet—and his proclivity toward meditating on nature and the things around him.

"It depicts one of my favorite Seattle models," says Aristides. "He is a poet, a nature enthusiast and a friend. The scene behind him is an enlarged portion of the landscape which I can see from my studio window. Meditations seemed a fitting title for someone who spends so much of his day in solitary contemplation."

Sarah Lamb, who lives on the East Coast, decided on roses as a subject matter because of the break painting such flowers provided her in the midst of a very long winter.

"Well, I was desperate to paint some beautiful flowers in the dead of winter," says Lamb. "And since peonies weren't in season, these pale pink roses filled the bill."

Edward Minoff's work, Landfall, is a continuation of his somewhat new obsession with oceans and all of the natural laws that play into the waves.

"When you stand in front of a wave during a storm, you just feel the power and the force of it all," says Minoff. "As an artist, I'm thinking about how to capture the weight and the mass of that. When I'm working, I'm thinking, 'When on with the waves? How does the structure create different kinds of the I take all these notes visually and to break that down."
